




We were able to end up "in the black" in 2022, despite very little rental income. The Club added 40 new members this year, and these dues contributed to our overall financial stability. Our total assets stand at a healthy \$970,722! Thanks to Nomi Trapnell, our Finance Officer, for her continued hard work.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

In 2020-21 we were able to do substantial improvements to the Clubhouse including the roof and the floor.

Our next step is to renovate our kitchen. We will replace old cabinets and counters, and get new appliances which maintain the historic character of the Clubhouse while meeting County Health and ADA requirements.

This spring we started our "Kitchen Kickoff"; a capital campaign to finance the changes, which are projected to happen in 2024.

PROGRAMS & SPECIAL EVENTS

One of the challenges we faced this past year was "coming back" after the COVID closedown. Most members were tired of Zoom, and were looking forward to returning to the Clubhouse in person. Our Programs Committee took on the challenge, combining special events and programs sponsored by the Class of 2021.

Special Events

The Club was extremely fortunate to experience a wide variety of exceptional special events and programs this year, which involved our community. Pecha Kucha was an evening where five local non-profits gave us information about their organization in fast-paced 20-slide presentations. Over 150 people attended, 58 of whom were not members!

The Women's History Panel was another special event where three local women who are active in our community participated in a discussion led by local community leader Mary Hughes. The panelists were Mora Oommen, from YCS, Millicent Grant, from the East Palo Alto Senior Center, and Sarah Cody, who is the Public Health Director of Santa Clara County. We had 140 attendees, many from our local community.

After a 2-year absence, the Palo Alto May Fete Parade and Fair were held in downtown Palo Alto. Members of the Club marched in the Parade, and were also privileged to ride in antique cars! We had a table at the Fair (which is an event for local non-profits to promote their



activities) and handed out "Famous Women in US History" coloring books to children and adults.

Our Clubhouse roof was replaced last year during our COVID closing. We were able to do this largely because Santa Clara County Supervisor Joe Simitian helped us get a grant from the County. We held a brief ceremony to thank him for his help, and gave him a painting of the Clubhouse.







PROGRAMS – CLASS OF 2021

Our newest class of members, the Class of 2021, elected to do a series of evening fun programs as their class project. They started out with a bang, with our Club Opening in September. The theme was the Roaring 20s, and members were invited to dress up in period dresses. Over 100 members attended, and it was a wonderful "welcome back" after the COVID closing.
